Autism Canada is a nationwide organization committed to advocating for the rights and needs of individuals with Autism Spectrum Disorder (ASD) and their families, caregivers, and allies. Since 1976, our primary objective has been to raise public awareness about autism, collaborate with diverse stakeholders to shape public policies and promote best practices within the field. We aim to foster a national dialogue that identifies effective strategies for ensuring equitable access to funding and services for people with ASD. Our team comprises individuals who have personal connections to autism and neurodiversity, including those who are on the Autism Spectrum themselves.

WHAT WE DO

We have an external advisory group known as "Autism Ambassadors," consisting exclusively of individuals on the Spectrum. These Autism Ambassadors provide invaluable insights and guidance on matters that are relevant to the autistic community in Canada. Our strategic goals revolve around creating a transformative future for individuals on the Autism Spectrum. To achieve this, we implement high-quality programs to empower and support individuals with ASD. One such program is the annual Au-Some Conference, a unique event exclusively developed and presented by individuals on the Autism Spectrum. Additionally, we take pride in pioneering innovative initiatives like the Search and Rescue for Autism program, which is the first of its kind, and the Recognizing Behaviours and Sensory Support programs. Furthermore, Autism Canada hosts the Family Support Program, ensuring practical and timely support is readily available to individuals and families in need.

AUTISM CANADA'S TREASURER'S REPORT

Total revenue for the year was \$524,365, a decrease of 17% over 2021 revenue of \$632,775. Donation revenue accounted for \$348,918 or 67% of total revenue, and this represents a 10% increase over 2021 donations. Grant revenue, which accounts for 27% of total revenue, was lower compared to 2021 by \$134,962.


Operating expenses of \$602,291 were 20% higher than 2021 and this was primarily due to the hiring of a full-time fund development manager. The Society ended the year with a deficit of \$77,926 compared to a surplus of \$132,433 in 2021.

Autism Society Canada received a qualified audit opinion for 2022. This is because the organization receives revenue from fundraising initiatives and donations, which are not susceptible to satisfactory audit verification. This is common amongst charities that receive revenue from donations and fundraising events.

Lastly, I would like to express my appreciation to the members of the audit and finance committee of the board, who are responsible for oversight of the financial affairs of the Society.

Our dedicated staff and volunteers receive and respond to thousands of inquiries annually, providing resources, referrals, services, and advocacy for those facing challenges with an autism diagnosis and potential co-occurring conditions.

Each inquiry is researched and addressed with available resources according to the province or community. This can include resources related to employment, education, diagnosis, housing, and funding based on the location and severity of the condition.

Our Family Support Team is available to assist not only children on the Spectrum, their parents, and caregivers but also youth, adults, and seniors.

SEARCH AND RESCUE FOR AUTISM

The community needs prevention tools, and an understanding on how best to communicate with First Responders. We developed training materials for emergency personnel and resources for the Autism Community.
