About Autism Canada

Autism Canada is the only Canadian organization with a national perspective on the issues currently facing those with Autism Spectrum Disorder (ASD), their families, caregivers, and other stakeholders.

Autism Canada has been generating public awareness about ASD in Canada since 1976. Together, with our counterparts, we work to share expertise, build consensus and inform public policy. In addition to encouraging best practices, we actively promote national dialogue on the most effective strategies for building equitable access to funding and services.

Every one of our staff and Board of Directors has a personal connection to ASD and neurodiversity or are on the Autism Spectrum themselves. Additionally, Autism Canada is guided by an external advisory group called "Autism Ambassadors" made up entirely of individuals on the spectrum. The Autism Ambassadors are a consistent and direct connection to the autism community in Canada and act as our consultants on issues relevant to the autism community.

Our strategic objectives focus on changing the future for those on the Autism Spectrum through the delivery of the highest quality programs like the national annual Au-Some Conference, written and presented solely by those on the Autism Spectrum. We are home to the first of its kind Search and Rescue for Autism program as well as the Recognizing Behaviours and Sensory Support programs. Additionally, Autism Canada hosts the Family Services Program which allows us to provide practical and timely support to individuals and families in need.






Accesibility for Ontarians with Disabilities

The Accessibility for Ontarians with Disabilities Act (AODA) was enacted to expand the government's mission to offer full accessibility to all disabled Ontarians by 2025. All Autism Canada staff and Board Directors are certified compliant with AODA.

Autism Society Canada Treasurer's Report

Despite the challenges faced by many charitable organizations in 2020 related to COVID-19 specifically, around reduced donations, Autism Society Canada saw total revenues increase over 2019. Total revenue for the year was \$606,106, an increase of 11% over 2019. Grant revenue at \$313,902 was 2% higher than in 2019.

Donations of \$200,635 were lower than in 2019 by 13%. This was offset by the receipt of \$67,148 from the Canada Emergency Wage Subsidy program. Expenditures for 2020 were \$475,435, a reduction of 11% over 2019. The organization achieved a surplus of \$130,671.

Autism Society Canada received a qualified audit opinion for 2020. This was due to the fact that we derive revenues from fundraising activities and donations, the completeness of which is not susceptible to satisfactory audit verification. This type of qualification is common among chartable organizations engaged in fundraising activities.



Family Support Services

Autism Canada's Family Service Program has been operational for over a decade and serves as our front-line connection to individuals and families in need. Our dedicated staff and volunteers receive and respond to thousands of inquiries annually, providing resources, referrals, services, and crisis support to those struggling with an ASD diagnosis and potential co-occurring conditions.

Each inquiry is researched and responded to with available resources by province or community. This can include employment, education, diagnosis, housing, and funding according to location and nature of severity. With the current global pandemic and the simultaneous suspension or elimination of essential support programs, uncertainties within school networks, job loss, homelessness, and severe mental health concerns, crisis inquiries have become increasingly common.

The Family Service Team at Autism Canada is trained to provide the support necessary for the crisis situations some on the Autism Spectrum may be facing.

2020 Events & Activities



Our free, annual Au-Some Conference included 8 presenters, all of whom are on the spectrum, has been viewed over 1,600 times on YouTube and has an additional 400+ viewers on the individual presentations. We also received over \$3,000 in donations in addition to sponsorships.

On April 15, 2020, we launched the Sharing the Spectrum podcast with an episode about Autism Canada and autism awareness. Over the course of the year, we published seven additional episodes and had 2,500 downloads of the combined episodes.





Sensory Support Kits

Autism Canada's Sensory Support Kits were developed in 2020 as a physical resource for organizations who host or support individuals on the Autism Spectrum. Tactile and sensory items support efforts to selfregulate and remain calm in an emotional, overwhelming or stressful situation. Offering sensory supports to those on the Autism Spectrum when they are experiencing stress can help them avoid a sensory meltdown or a shutdown.
